Dear Chairman Dingell and Ranking Member Barton:

The undersigned members of the Health IT Now Coalition support your efforts to pass H.R. 6357, the bipartisan "Protecting Records, Optimizing Treatment, and Easing Communication through Healthcare Technology Act," or "PRO(TECH)T Act.

We are a diverse coalition, and some of our members have written to you separately to express concerns about certain aspects of the bill.

We do believe, however, this is an important initiative that meets the broad principles of the coalition. Specifically, the bill:

- Establishes a formal structure to adopt national interoperability standards and a creating a clear pathway for product certification;
- Provides financial incentives through grants, loans and federal contracting;
- Allows for education of consumers and providers about the benefits and use of health IT; and
- Creates a framework to address privacy and security issues.

These provisions could promote better care at lower costs in both public programs and in the private health care market.

It is extremely important that legislation focused on the adoption and use of safe and secure electronic health information systems be adopted as soon as possible, as such systems will be the foundation for essential improvements in quality and access to care. Without a bill passed this year, there will be significant delays in adoption, with resulting delays in evidence-based medicine, expanded access, and value-based purchasing. You have worked hard to advance this legislation, and we urge you to keep on working for a final draft that can be sent to the President for signature. We believe Congress should be able to point to passage of a bipartisan bill for investment in health IT this year as a major accomplishment before adjournment.

Our members want to work with you to address their concerns and to help ensure a bill that promotes health IT is signed into law this year.
