John Spiegel Bio

John Spiegel began his career in health care in 1967 in the Medicaid program. He worked in various components of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services and its predecessor organizations holding a variety of senior management team positions including director of the Office of Field Operations, director of the Executive Secretariat and the Office of Executive Operations, and deputy director of the Health Standards and Quality Bureau. He also worked in the Washington office of the Centers for Disease Control and prevention. He retired from federal service in 1994. During his time away from Federal Service, he was a private consultant, held an adjunct appointment at the School of Public Health at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and worked at the Alliance of Community Health Plans in Washington, DC. In June 2010, he returned to Federal Service as the director of the Medicare Program Integrity Group in the Center for Program Integrity at CMS.
